#### STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY

To encourage faithful stewardship of Divine gifts of time, talents, and treasure to support our Lord's Church; and help, in Jesus' name, all those within our reach who need it.

Our congregation weathered the storm of Covid and has been able to provide significant aid to others in need. Your faithful stewardship has literally not just kept our church functioning, but kept necessities of life provided for our neighbors in need.

Funds available for Our Pastor to assist in paying electric or propane or water bills during times of misfortune are also a powerful witness for Christ. Lisa helps coordinate firewood requests for those in need. UCAF impacts many lives as we serve Christ by serving others in need.

Your response to our fall stewardship information and opportunity letter helps the council to plan for the "expected and the unexpected" needs of congregational functioning and our outreach. Please respond to the fall stewardship letter. The updated contact information, participation interests and giving estimates assist your Council in planning. Your generosity literally provides nutrition for student's preschool thru grade 12 who would otherwise be hungry at school and at home. UCAF supports the ALM food bank with funds, rotating sacking responsibility and volunteers for supply shipment unloading. Susan Stokes is full time staff with this vital community organization.

UCAF was at the forefront of providing volunteers, funding housing assistance and spiritual support for the many who were forced to evacuate because of the massive wildfires in our area spring 2022. Many are to be thanked for the caring outreach which occurred. Samaritan's Purse was here for the "long haul". The dedication and organization of the Samaritan's Purse staff was exemplary and inspiring. Divine Love in Action helped heal fresh losses and change old stereotypes.

Several memorial gifts were made and acknowledged during the year. There will be near- and long-term capital projects. Eventual replacement of the original heating system is one.

There are many ways to support UCAF and our missions. We have resumed plate offering. Checks can be mailed to UCAF, PO Box 949, Angel Fire, NM 87710. A simple "automatic push" from your bank (ACH draft) to the UCAF account at IN Bank is used by many. There is a secure link for online giving at UCAF website or at the weekly email "Sunday's Coming". For those of us with retirement investment RMD (Required Minimum Distribution) you might find it convenient and advantageous to make contributions to UCAF by this funding method. By making a "qualified charitable contribution", you are not required to have that amount added to your taxable income. This method is simple and secure. Most retirement fund custodians (banks and brokerage houses) do not charge for mailing such checks. Gifts of stocks or bonds can also be made periodically or through one's estate planning.

## **Community Assistance Grants**

As part of the Missions program at the United Church of Angel Fire, we are honored to be able to offer assistance to those in need in our area. In addition to assistance with firewood for heating and cooking and nutritional support through ALM, our church offers Community Assistance Grants (CAGs) to help with other financial needs. These CAGs are governed by limits and guidelines that have been approved by the Church Council.

During the fiscal year 2022-2023 we have been able to assist nineteen households. These CAGs have enabled families to avoid loss of electricity and propane, and even to avoid loss of their home through rental assistance. In another case, we were able to provide a young student with eyecare and eyeglasses, providing an avenue for success in school.

#### **CHRISTIAN EDUCATION MINISTRY**

Peggy Trott left a big hole to fill when I took on the Chair of the Christian Education. Fortunately, she had planned out Adult Sunday School for the 3rd quarter of 2022 for me to get my feet on the ground in this new role. With Biblical Interpretation initially led by Dr. Andy Konigsmark, then finished up by Peggy Trott, we then spent a month last September studying Why We Do What We Do in Church covering Worship 101, Baptism 101 and Communion 101. We then returned to complete the Great Courses Understanding the Old Testament. Up to Advent, where we began Matt Rawle's The Heart that Grew Three Sizes. Peggy Trott began our 2023 year with Essential Biblical Heroes You Need in your Life. This was followed by Harry Martz led Ray Lander Loan's With All Your Heart. Then we started Adam Hamilton's Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts & Outlaws. We then had back-to-back Max Lucado's studies of Romans, In the Grip of Grace and In the Footsteps of the Savior. I added my learnings from Sharon's and my recent trip in February to the Holy Land to Max Lucado's study of In the Footsteps of the Savior which went to the same places as our tour in February. We spent a couple of weeks in late July with current events in a Christian context including the state of Fatherlessness in America and the state of Earth's Inner Core. Currently, Larry Peckham is teaching us about Why We Have So Many Denominations. And we're excited to have Dennis Groat touch on New Beginnings as UCAF starts with its new minister, Rev. David Wilman.

Christian Education has also provided for Children's Christian Education by placing in the Narthex Children Church Worship Service Activity Bags. The Red bags are for 6 and under in age. The Blue bags are for ages 7 and up. These are for parents/grandparents/guardians bringing children to worship to use during the Worship Service with activities for their Child. Parents or others are asked to return used Worship Bags into the Narthex afterwards, we'll replenish all the Worship Bags where they'll be updated with activity pages on a weekly basis.

Adult Christian Education meets Sunday mornings starting at 9:45 am and finishing up with plenty of time before Worship at 11:00 am. We're a group of Adult Christians on individual Faith Journeys who enjoy the discussion, coffee and sometimes, sweets with each other. And we'd love to have you join us!

If this or our other studies interest you and you don't mind coming a bit earlier Sunday morning to church, please join us as we all move along on our individual Faith Journey seeking God's will in our lives.

#### MEMBERSHIP/OUTREACH COMMITTEE

Mission Statement: To share God's word with the community and to encourage others to visit and join our UCAF family in worship, study, fellowship, and service as well as support the church's mission to be "Divine Love in Action."

#### Activities:

- 1. Welcome Folders are assembled and made ready to be given to first-time visitors. Included in the folders are a brochure with information about the church, a book mark, a UCAF note card, and cards showing what is needed by the missions UCAF supports (ALM Food Pantry and Heart of Taos).
- 2. Cards, texts, or emails are sent weekly to first-time visitors the following week if we are able to get addresses/phone numbers/emails from first-timers.
- 3. As part of each Sunday bulletin there is a perforated form to be filled out by visitors or by those wishing to update information. These forms are to be filled out, torn off, and placed in the offering plates. On the reverse side is a prayer request form to alert the minister, administrative assistant, and/or church council of a prayer need. It can be privately shared or in the bulletin starting the next week.
- 4. UCAF color brochures have been placed around Moreno Valley to provide information regarding the church name, address, and phone number.
- 5. Beginning in September we undertook providing meals for up to 75 kids and sponsors one Wednesday night a month for the youth group at the Moreno Valley Church of Christ. Numerous kids in our community take part in this program. Many members of our congregation volunteered to make and deliver submarine sandwiches or Sloppy Joe's, chips, and cookies for these meals. We did this project through May and will begin again in September, 2023
- 6. Thanksgiving cards were hand addressed, signed, and mailed to all full-time members. associate members, and regular attenders in November.
- 7. The first Thursday of May is the National Day of Prayer. The Outreach Committee participated in the local Ministerial Alliance event by handing out informational brochures about UCAF to those in attendance.
- 8. "Happy Mother's Day" carnations were given out on May 7th to all our ladies in honor of Mother's Day.
- 9. "Happy Father's Day" metal, retractable tape measures were given to our gentlemen on June 18th as they entered the church in honor of the occasion.
- 10. "Membership Update" forms help us keep our database current.
- 11. We are pleased to have welcomed 24 new members this year!

#### **FIREWOOD ANGELS (Dave Hartson)**

Firewood Angels began as trees cleared from UCAF member's building lots that were blocked, split and given to those in need in the early 2000s. Last winter, Firewood Angels (FWA) delivered 117 pickup loads of split, dry firewood to 32 families in the Moreno Valley.

Most of our recipients are elderly or working with low income. Most recipients use firewood to save on propane or electric heating costs. For some, firewood is their only heat source. Some even cook with wood!

This spring, FWA expanded our processing capacity with the acquisition of a commercial splitter (thanks to UCAF Christmas Eve Offering and special donations). A split wood conveyer was also donated by a FWA patron. This makes the task of moving and stacking wood for drying much less onerous for our aging volunteers. We still use our small splitters for small "rounds". Additionally, the Village of Angel Fire Wildland Fire fighters now separate usable firewood from slash. They requested the loan of one of FWA old splitters which we provided. The Wildland Fire Fighters now cut the salvage wood into blocks, split and distribute the firewood to those in need in Mora and Cimmaron (where they reside). We see this as a win/win. The FWA also bought a used front loader/backhoe from the departing GSR Ranger. This backhoe has been fitted with a "thumb" (welded in place by Randy Kaiser). This machine is necessary to safely handle long logs which the US Forest Service donated to FWA last summer as they created firebreaks while fighting the Hermit's Peak and Calf Canyon fires.

In the future, FWA plans to source logs from the burn areas as well. We still need volunteers! There are summer tasks for all levels of strength and experience. Ladies and youth participate. All are welcome. FWA provides gloves, eye and ear protection. Closed toe shoes and long pants are required. We meet at the Elliot Barker Girl Scout Ranch Tuesday mornings at 0900. We enter through the south gate on Elliot Barker Road (just north of the Post Office and on the way to our Moreno Valley Clinic). During fall, winter, and spring, we deliver firewood. We have several 4-wheel drive "wood trucks" that this year will be stored under cover at our processing site for firewood delivery (you may, but do not need to use your personal vehicle). We especially need help during our winter season!

#### **MEDICAL EQUIPMENT (Dave Hartson)**

The medical equipment "recycling" program at UCAF continues. This was first suggested by our church secretary, Joyce McCabe in 2016. Many pieces of "durable" medical equipment are purchased, used for a short time and then discarded. The items which are available include crutches, walkers, shower chairs, bedside toilets, wheelchairs, canes, walking boots, walking safety belts, knee braces of various types, a CPM machine, a CPAP machine, oxygen concentrators, oxygen tanks, incontinence underwear, urinals. This equipment is collected, cleaned, and stored. The inventory is now stored in the downstairs unused showers in the men's and women's restrooms. Equipment is to be loaned or given to anyone who has the need. The UCAF office, The Moreno Valley Healthcare Clinic and Best Care Pharmacy know of the service. #### **CONGREGATIONAL CARE MINISTRY**

We tried something different this year; so, instead of serving on paper plates and plastic ware, we had individuals or teams who decorated a table for 6 with fun place settings. There were cowboys/cowgirls, patriotic, and holiday themes along with vintage dishes and contemporary settings. Each table had a themed centerpiece which was given as a door prize.

September 8<sup>th,</sup> we traveled to Abiquiu and met at the O'Keeffe's Welcome Center. We learned about Georgia O'Keeffe's life at Ghost Ranch, Abiquiu, and her camping trips to photograph the beautiful vistas of New Mexico and Arizona to use for her paintings.

Our next stop was lunch at the Café Abiquiu in the 30 room Abiquiu Inn. Besides eating a delicious lunch, many scoped out the AZUL Gift Ship and the Galeria Arriba upstairs.

Next stop was the Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic Parish which was built in 1754 and renovated in 1935. It is still holding seven services a week.

Bosshard's Gallery was a very special stop since we learned about the history of Abiquiu and all the unique buildings and their owners. Bosshard's is an historic adobe compound built around 1893. It has had many owners and now houses art, antiques, artifacts and hand-crafted furniture from cultures the Southwest and around the world. Our final stop was Bode's General Store and Kitchen. This store has been serving locals, travelers, stray artists and bandits since 1893. You name it and they probably have it: groceries, produce, alcohol, hardware, livestock feed, housewares, cards, gifts, sporting goods and 24-hour gasoline.

Everyone had a wonderful time and we look forward to the next Women's Fellowship adventure.
